- (e) *praeterea ... versas* (lines 659–664). Identify **two** figures of speech used in these lines **and** state their effect. Support your answer by quoting the Latin text. [4]

- (c) *Faune* (line 777). Analyse this mythological reference. [2]
- (d) *rursus ... revellit* (lines 784–787). Outline the goddesses’ actions. Support your answer by quoting the Latin text. [4]
- (e) *olli ... anheli* (lines 788–790). Describe the heroes. Support your answer by quoting the Latin text. [4]

- (d) *ratione ... parcendo* (lines 6–7). State Vercingetorix’s reasoning regarding the food supply. Quotation of the Latin text is **not** required. [2]
- (e) *frumentum ... recepit* (lines 10–11). List **three** things Vercingetorix did to prepare for the seige. Support your answer by quoting the Latin text. [3]

- (d) *quibus ... attribuerat* (lines 7–8). Outline how Caesar had rewarded Commius. Quotation of the Latin text is **not** required. [2]
- (e) *tamen ... incumberent* (lines 8–10). State the nature of the Gauls' commitment to the war. Support your answer by quoting the Latin text. [4]
