Core theme: Being human

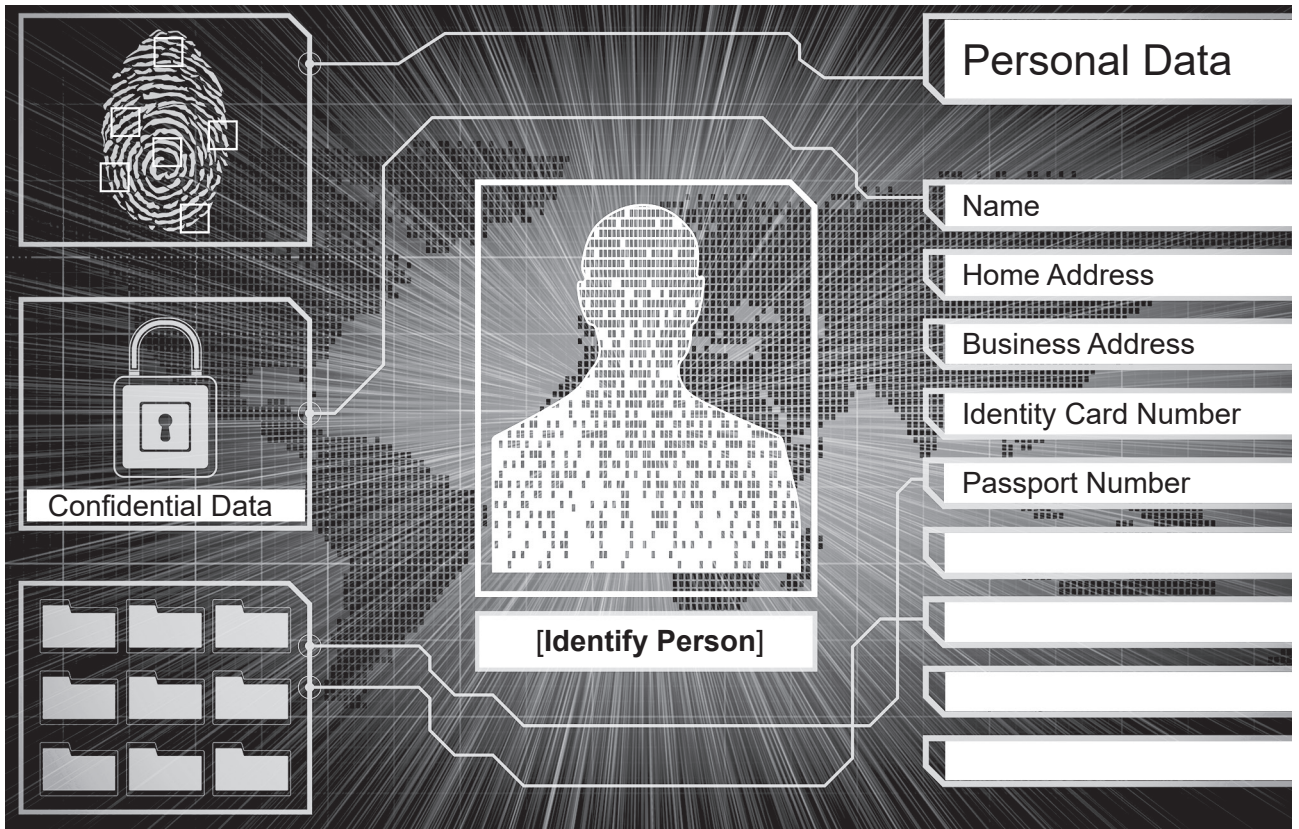
1. Read the following text and develop your response as indicated below.
